National Quilting Day—16 March 2024

Quilting refers to the technique of joining at least two fabric layers by stitches or ties. The quilting practice dates back as far as 3400 B.C. It was mainly a practical technique that provided physical protection and insulation. However, decorative elements were often also present and many quilts are now primarily art pieces.

In the United States, quiltmaking was common in the late 17th century and early years of the 18th century. In these times, only the wealthy had the time to practice quilting so it was done by only a few persons. Commercial blankets or woven coverlets were a more economical bed covering for most people unlike the colonial quilt bed covering which displayed the fine needlework of the maker, such as the Baltimore album quilts. Presently, quilting is now a popular hobby, with an estimated base of twenty-one million quilters.

The oldest example of a quilted piece is kept at the Saint Petersburg department of the Russian Academy of Sciences, Archaeology section. It is a linen carpet that was found in a Mongolian cave, between 100 B.C. and 200 A.D.

The origin of the quilting day can be traced to the Quilters Day Out, which was organized by the Kentucky Heritage Quilt Society in 1989 to celebrate the ancient tradition and its practice in the state of Kentucky. Two years later, this event became so popular that the National Quilting Association decided to declare an official holiday for quilting. From this day, the name changed from Quilters Day Out to National Quilting Day. Over the years, this event has attracted people to celebrate from all over the world and participate in helping to build and maintain the global heritage of quilting.

The first remnants of quilting were dated to 3400 B.C., showing that this art form had existed far into prehistory. They were traded extensively until sometime in the 12th century when these types of trade goods were returned from the Middle East by the Crusaders. Since then, it had become an integral part of the Colonial textile arts and one of the things they were well known for.


A quilt is a type of bed cover, traditionally composed of three layers of fiber, a woven cloth top, a layer of batting or wadding, and a woven back, combined using the technique of quilting. A quilt is distinguishable from other types of blankets because it is pieced together with several pieces of cloth.

National Quilting Day recognizes quiltmakers and their quilt-making abilities. The word 'quilt' comes from the Latin word 'culcita,' which means stuffed sack, it became adapted to the English language from the French word 'cuilte.'

Quilting practices can be found in almost every area of the world and it is celebrated on the third Saturday in March every year. The National Quilting Association started National Quilting Day in 1991 and since then it has grown into a global celebration for all quilt lovers and makers.

In recognition of National Quilting Day, members are invited to bring along any International themed quilts, artwork or other pieces made with fabric purchased internationally.

Welcome back and Happy New Year to those of you who weren't at January's Sit and Sew. Thanks to the 33 of you who did come along in January for a very pleasant, laid back day that everyone seemed to enjoy.

Those committee members who were there worked on getting the Quilt In plans in order and making some decisions including setting the theme for this year's Challenge. We have worked with the Peace of Mind logo to come up with the theme, more details further into the Newsletter. But those of you who love purple will like this one!! You must use purple in your block. It doesn't have to be the background colour, however, it should be a dominant feature.

The other aspect of the Challenge is a Daisy... although the logo is not strictly speaking a daisy (see image of logo), we have decided it can be represented in a challenge block as a daisy, but it's your option to put in any form of daisy you choose. You don't have to use the daisy at all, you can piece a block of any description as long as it uses purple. We felt the daisy would give some people an idea of where to go with their challenge block.



So go for it, impress us with your vision of how to represent 'Purple' in a Challenge. I hope that many of you will take up the challenge and we'll have many blocks to display at Quilt In which can be made into charity quilts after the event.

I will have the Quilt In A4 and A5 sized posters printed for people to take and use to promote the event. We would love you to ask to display the posters wherever you can to get the word out there, shops, notice boards, even the back window of your car. You can also get the poster in digital form and post it on your social pages or send it to friends, locally or in other parts of the State. The more we promote the event, the better it is for our Guild. We will

be donating the proceeds of the raffle and Guessing competition to our chosen Charity, so we need a good attendance so we cover our expenses.

I'm wondering how the Mystery Quilt makers are getting on with their blocks. The third instalment of instructions is in later pages, with only one more instalment to come in the March Newsletter. As most of you machine quilt, I would hope to start seeing the results at the April meeting. I'm aiming to have mine done by then, but need to get a move on, as I hand quilt and haven't yet started!! I can see quite a few long nights of quilting coming up. It just better not be hot evenings!!





MYSTERY QUILT: PART 3 ANNE CLUTTERBUCK

Be careful with this next set of instructions... Look at the photos to see what I am trying to describe!

(1) Join 2 of your half light, half dark triangles as per photos 1 and 2





Make 32 of these units. (Unit 1). (Photo 1 & 2 = Unit 1)

The design of the quilt will be more cohesive and make better impact if you join two of the same colour darks (ie two dark blue, or two dark green etc) in these units as shown in photos 1 and 2. I actually joined two of the same fabric to make mine, but this is not critical.

(2) Join 2 of your half light half dark triangles as per photo 3.



Make 32 of these units. (Unit 2 Photo 3 =Unit 2) With these units it is better you join two different coloured darks as per photo 3

(3) Join 2 of Unit 1 to 2 of Unit 2 as per the photo.


Make 32 of these combined Units_(Unit 3)_____Photo 4 = Unit 3) It is very important that the units be pieced in direction exactly as shown in Photo 4.

Again it is important to keep the seam lines all going in the same direction as you did with the all dark blocks and all light blocks. All seams in all of the blocks (Dark, Light and Mixed) need to be facing in the same direction



In the fourth and final instalment, next month, I will give instructions for piecing blocks and putting them altogether, along with suggestions for a border (but you can choose what border you wish to add to this quilt).

Again, if my instructions are not clear, do get in touch with me. Happy stitching, Anne.

AUSSIE HERO QUILTS Sue Palmer

Aussie Heroes has been up and running since January2012 . Aussie Hero Quilts (and Laundry Bags) has continued to grow steadily.

Quilt Size:


The quilts were designed to be portable and easy to post. Anything posted to the members with an AFPO address and under 2kg is free.

Aussie Hero Quilts are sized to be the width of the fabric so about 42". The length should be 70". I know some of you will think that this size seems a little narrow, but the quilts also have to be small enough for the recipients to fit into their luggage if they are required to move from one location to another unexpectedly. They also need to be the right size to fit on top of a navy bunk at sea and a bunk bed or stretcher on land. If you make the quilts too wide this makes them too big and bulky.

Every Quilt must have an Aussie Hero label on it as follows:

Made for an Aussie Hero .
With gratitude for your service



Guidelines for the Handling of donated Goods

These guidelines were developed by the Geelong Patchwork & Quilters Guild Inc Committee of 2023/24. It was due to an increased number of donations from members of the Guild, bequeathed through their estate, or from members of the public who, with the best of intentions, wanted their materials to go to those who would put them to good use.

It gave rise to issues over machinery, specifically sewing machines, overlockers etc being a part of the bequest, along with discussions about storage of these donated goods and who should be responsible for the sorting and storage of said goods.

To date these donations have been handled on an ad hoc basis, and reliant on the goodwill of those members (mainly current committee) who put their hands up to visit the homes of the donors, sorted and collected the goods and stored them in their own homes/businesses.

This committee was asked to come up with a policy for dealing with these issues.

- 1. The committee recommends that the Guild does not handle any machinery whatsoever. Mostly the machinery is not suitable for resale and we are not responsible for having machines tested for functionality and safety. Members planning on leaving items to the Guild in their will should note that no machinery be included in the bequest.
- 2. The committee feels that donations of quilt suitable fabric ie quality cotton fabric (not drapery, curtain or furnishing fabrics) will always be acceptable for use in charity quilts. It is not the responsibility of any Guild member to have to sort through collections to find usable quilt fabrics. This should be done by the family/ donor- but should the Guild member who is collecting the donation be willing to help with sorting, that is at their own discretion.
- 3. Other items that are acceptable, and also it is at the discretion of the collector of goods, to accept or reject these items, include: Donations of thread, notions, balls of knitting wool (for KOGO projects). Quilt books- if in excellent condition, that could be an adjunct to our Guild Library, or are suitable for resale to raise funds for the Guild Library.
- 4. Storage for the foreseeable future, the problem of storage of large donations will be up to the individual who undertakes to handle the donation. The Guild does not have the facility to store fabrics and notions safely. This then becomes an individual choice to deal with storage.

The Guild is under NO obligation to take any donation – but the committee hopes that future members will consider the value to our charity programs, and the wishes of the donor when deciding whether or not to handle any donation.
