#### PRESIDENTS REPORT



Hello Ladies,

Inside this newsletter is the start of the Mystery Quilt that I proposed at the October meeting. I hope a number of you will attempt it.

I am trying to write the instructions clearly so there is no confusion - putting the pattern together is a little more tricky that it might appear at the beginning – you are going to need to concentrate when assembling various

units. I am making it myself so I can know where the difficulties may lie – and I've had to unpick a lot of items already. But I believe the end results will be worth the time and effort.

I plan to put forward the instructions each month for 4 months. So plenty of time for you to tackle each month's 'assignment' without overdoing the workload. You should still have plenty of time to do other quilting projects of your own.

We have set up an Instagram page for the Guild in the past couple of weeks. This page will be 'run' by 3 enthusiastic volunteers – Melinda Bampfield, Elizabeth Little and Stacey Skinner.



#### OCTOBER GUEST SPEAKER - PURPLE PIXIES




Leslie Clarke a long time member of the Guild and Purple Pixies, shared the story of the Purple Pixies.



## Southern Cross Quilters (SCQuilters) Retreat *Judy Bubb*

This group began as an email list group of Australian and NZ quilters starting 29 years ago, we are now on Facebook. In 1998 yearly retreats began so all could catch up face to face. They have been located in many places over Australia and twice in New Zealand. The retreats involve sit and sew, workshops, show and tell, fat quarter swap, knife/scissor sharpening (no axes this year. There is a story about this but....), speakers, signatures blocks, swag bags, pop up shops, challenges, collecting for a different chosen charity each year, food, laughter and ending with a Shop Hop by Bus.

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Several of the Guild Members are members of SCQuilters and attended this years retreat which was held in Albury. Our Geelong Retreaters were Jean, Barbara, Dallas, Marilyn, Sue, Pam, Wendy and myself. Armed with our free seniors travel we caught the train to Southern Cross then the Albury train. We were greeted by more SCQuilters onboard. Arriving at Albury it was a short walk to the Mantra Hotel where the retreat was being held and where we were staying for 5 nights. I say a short walk but we did have our suitcases with wheels on a rough path. Some of us did struggle.

Our retreat started with a glass of wine (hotel had happy hour which we enjoyed several times) to celebrate the start of a great retreat. Thursday night we dined at Downtown Pizzeria with approximately 60 other SCQuilters. Friday morning involved a bit of shopping and checking out the local patchwork shop. Registration was 2.00pm with 90 women gathering in the Southern Cross Function Room.

So, the retreat began with us working on hand projects and chatting. Projects including EPP, applique, knitting, crochet and hand quilting were spread over all tables. Our sit and sewing sessions were occasionally held up by shopping at the Pop-Up shops, show and tell, fat quarter draws, lucky door prizes and always food. The challenge was shown on Sunday afternoon. The theme this year being "Women you Admire"

Workshops we chose to do were Mandela Embroidery, Curator's talk at MAMA, Art Gallery and Yindyamerra Sculpture Walk with Auntie Ruth Davys.

Saturday night dinners are always a grand affair with a theme. This year it was Paint the Town Red. All ladies dressed in red and as tradition dictates, we must wear Tiaras. Fascinators have also been known to make an appearance. In Jean and Barbara's case this year jazzy hats!

After dinner we enjoy a very interesting presentation by Sally Randle, Brisbane School of Needlework Studio. Sally is a long-time SCQuilter who is a qualified Royal School of Needlework Tutor having graduated from the RSN at Hampton Court Palace, England.

Our charity for this year was "Share the Dignity" for local women. And the pile was high! Organisers were very happy with our contribution.

Shop Hop by Bus is always fun. We went to two Patchwork shops, had lunch at Beechworth supplied by the Red Cross and a very informative bus tour around the streets of Beechworth.

Looking forward to next year which will be held on the Gold Coast.

## Lions Club of Quilters Victoria stitches the world together


The Lions Club of Quilters Victoria in District V1-4 have undertaken their most ambitious project yet, the International Quilt Challenge.

As part of their principle project, the Australian Quilt & Textile Collection (AQTC), the Club is requesting quilters of all skill levels from across the world to get involved. The 'Our World – Coming Together' International Quilt challenge is a celebration of the global community, with 40cm x 40cm entries to be based on aspects of its creator's home country.

The final product, will be on exhibition at the Lions Clubs International Convention held in Melbourne in 2024.

The quilts will also be exhibited at Pour l'Amour du Fil in Nantes, France, in April 2025.

After exhibition, the quilts will be permanently acquired by the Lions Club of Quilters Victoria's AQTC which aims to preserve the diversity of quilts and their stories.

## MYSTERY QUILT: ANNE CLUTTERBUCK

At the October meeting I asked if members would be keen to do a mystery quilt and received a positive response. So I have settled on a pattern and will be publishing the details over a few months in instalments. I will be keeping it a mystery for at least 3 instalments.

I have chosen a design that is classified as 'EASY' so that even the most inexperienced quilter in our group should feel confident about tackling this project. And yet, I think the end result is a visually attractive, pleasing quilt that most people will enjoy putting together. It is extremely suitable for those with 'healthy' stashes as it uses lots of scraps. If you don't have a wide collection of scraps perhaps you can do some swapping with others to increase your supply.

To get started:

Materials needed: These will make a quilt of approx.. 60" x 60"

Approx 1.7 m of mixed dark and medium dark scraps – can be of mixed colours – blues, greens, browns, grays, deep reds etc. They need to be of similar value.

Approx 1.7 m of mixed light scraps – preferably creams and beiges... but MUST offer a strong contrast to the darks. It's the contrast between lights and darks in this design that makes it really 'sing'. You can choose to use pastels for lights if you want.

½ m of a dark fabric for the inner border.

 $1\,\%$  m of a contrasting dark/medium dark fabric for the outer border and binding.

#### Part 1

Cut 128 - 3 and 7/8ths squares of your dark scraps

Cut 128 - 3 and 7/8ths squares of your light scraps

Cut all squares diagonally to create 2 right angled triangles. You should have 256 dark right angled triangles and 256 light right angled triangles.

Sew 128 of your dark triangles together to create squares ...mix up your fabrics when sewing these pairs together...

Sew 128 of your light triangles together to create squares – again mixing up your light fabrics to sew the pairs together.


You should end up with 64 dark squares and 64 light squares - each square made up of 2 different fabrics.


It is important to be careful sewing the two triangles

together as you will not be sewing on the straight of grain, and therefore it is too easy to stretch those seams.

That's enough for Part 1.


