

Pauline and I were impressed on how many members borrowed books and magazines at our March meeting. Keep it up Ladies!







March Speaker


Sonya Else

Sonya remembers sewing when she was ten, encouraged by her mother and grandmother. By the time she was twelve, she had her own sewing machine, beginning with doll's clothes, she quickly moved on to making her own clothes and school dresses.

Along with her mother, Sonya ran a retail clothing and fabric shop where she also made clothing to sell.

Twenty five years ago she started patchwork and quilting with Maureen from Quilting and Patchwork in Rochester and

hasn't looked back.




From there Sonya moved on to art quilts which she first designs and then goes on to work out how she is going to do it. She uses many different techniques to achieve her desired outcome with stunning results.

Tree with mushrooms Using Inktense pencils, Powertex transparent stiffening agent and wool.




Irene Blanck Workshop

On Saturday morning, 22nd March, fifteen ladies eagerly anticipated Irene Blanck's Kawandi workshop. After setting up, Irene explained the history of the Kawandi techniques. Kawandi quilts are made by the Siddi people who are an African diaspora of India. Their quilts are made with scraps of fabric, with batting made from scraps of old clothing (we used a piece of batting) and a large piece of sari for the backing. They come from very poor families and they make do with whatever they can.



A unique difference with Kawandi quilting is that the work is started on the outside and then stitched towards the centre.



We began enthusiastically. The first row of scrap strips was laid out on our preprepared backing. Then the stitching and chatting started. It wasn't long before we realised that this is a very time-consuming

process. However, as with all such processes, we saw that the possibilities with mixing colours and fabrics were endless. The overall effect is striking.



Irene was on hand throughout the day to share advice on the techniques. She also entertained us with her anecdotes of her travels in India and U.S.A. We look forward to seeing the finished quilts.

Tara Glastonbury


I'm Tara Glastonbury, a designer based in Melbourne (Naarm), Australia.

My patterns are for quilters who enjoy the process as much as the finish – who want to make something unique, not necessarily fast. Some designs use upcycled materials, others don't, but all are built with a focus on strong visual impact and thoughtful fabric choices -created with a designer's eye for form and composition.



With a background in graphic design and a long history in textile crafts, I'm drawn to the intersection of utility and creativity. For the last decade, I've combined the two by designing quilts.

Stitch & Yarn started as a blog to documenting family wedding quilts and my textile experiments while I waited out a company buy-out. I released my first quilt pattern in 2016, discovered #QuiltCon in 2017, and the rest, as they say, is history.



AUSSIE HERO QUILTS Sue Palmer

Aussie Heroes has been up and running since January2012 . Aussie Hero Quilts (and Laundry Bags) has continued to grow steadily.

These days quilts and laundry bags are mailed mostly


The quilts were designed to be portable and easy to post. Anything posted to the members with an AFPO address and under 2kg is free.

Aussie Hero Quilts are sized to be the width of the fabric so about 42". The length should be 70". I know some of you will think that this size seems a little narrow, but the quilts also have to be small enough for the recipients to fit into their luggage if they are required to move from one location to another unexpectedly. They also need to be the right size to fit on top of a navy bunk at sea and a bunk bed or stretcher on land. If you make the quilts too wide this makes them too big and bulky.

Every Quilt must have an Aussie Hero label on it as follows:

This is an
AUSSIE HERO QUILT
Made for an Aussie Hero .

If Aussie Hero Quilts is something you would like to get involved with speak to Sue Palmer. The Aussie Hero Quilts website is very comprehensive with tutorials available on how to make quilt blocks and also quilt patterns.
