

PRESIDENTS REPORT



Hello Ladies,

Well Quilt In is now behind us for this year, and I have to say I'm glad. It is always quite a bit of work to get it organised. This year we had a wonderful attendance — over 50 more quilters came this year compared to last, and that was pretty clear by how crowded the main hall was. On the whole, it was a successful day. The traders were very happy, our guest speaker, Veronique, was as delightful as she was when talking to us last year, and we made a lot of people happy with door prizes, raffle prizes, gifts on entry and of course free refreshments. We have taken note of the dissatisfaction of some with their table position at the rear of the hall, and Judy (assuming she is still willing to take on that task again next year!) will make sure those unhappy attendees get tables at or near the front next year. We don't set out to upset our good supporters. It is unfortunate that not everyone can have their ideal position. The feedback, other than table locations, was mostly very positive, the other main issue being the audio. The hall, being as full as it was, meant that the PA system did not carry as well as it did when we tested it at the start of the day. Not much we can do about that, I turned the volume up as high as I could.



Congratulations to all those who made challenge blocks – they will be turned into 2 beautiful quilts by Margaret Tembo again this year, as she has done for the past few years. One of those quilts will be donated to the Bluebird Foundation for further fund raising for their organisation. The other will become next year's raffle quilt, in due course. I am pleased to inform you that we raised \$1183 from the two raffles and the 6 ½ Inch square guessing competition for our chosen charity, the Bluebird Foundation. That money has already been given to them. I have had a very happy email of thanks from Lucy Jones in return. The 6 girls representing their Bluebird Senior Choir overcame their nervousness, sang for us, and spoke about the goals of the foundation. It was a pity that the sound system didn't quite allow for their performance and speech to be heard as well as it should.



On the day I was remiss in thanking all the volunteers who 'worked' at Quilt In on our behalf. To all those who gave up an hour or more on the day, and there were a lot of you, I apologise for not acknowledging your help at the time, but please accept my grateful thanks for all that you did to make the day run as well as it did. We could not have put on the event without your assistance. I am so pleased and proud that so many members took the time to make such a difference to the programme's operation. From helping with refreshments, welcoming visitors at the entrance desk, manning the two raffle desks or the Guessing competition, taking the Challenge

blocks, or being my stalwart helpers in Show & Tell, you are all wonderful. Your efforts are so very much appreciated.

I am attending the Colac Quilt In shortly and am so looking forward to being just a member of the audience – chatting with my Colac friends, sewing, listening to their two speakers and browsing their traders' offerings... it will be nice not to have to 'work' at this one!

There will be four of us showing different aspects of our craft for you to take an interest in. We hope you will find it an interesting meeting and will welcome your feedback afterwards. It has always been my aim to offer the opportunity to learn new skills or further members' understanding of the art and craft of quilting – the ultimate purpose of any Guild.

Apropos to that – I have been asked to organise workshops with Veronique Diligent, and Sonya Else. I would like to have an idea of how many of you would be keen to attend a workshop with Veronique on her beautiful book making, and with Sonya Else

on her seascape art quilts. Please would you let me know if you are interested in either of these proposed workshops. I would be setting them up for early next year – not too close together however.




shopping is needed before our June meeting.

Quilt In 2025

The Guild's 2025 Quilt In was held on 17th May in the Geelong Town Hall in Pakington Street. It was a huge success with249 attendees. It was a fun day and community collective of like-minded ladies (and some men) who all share a love of quilting, craft and of course, shopping.



The buzz in the room was palpable and welcoming with lots of socialising, chatting, sharing of news and catching up with old friends, many cups of tea and coffee and some sewing thrown in. The Traders were diverse and had lots of interesting merchandise on offer. As well as the traders, there were Door prizes,

Raffles, a Book sale, Guess the Number of Squares competition, and viewers vote for the best block in the Guild's challenge.

After a presentation by Lucy Jones from the Blue Bird Foundation, this years' chosen charity, we were entertained by their Senior Choir with angelic voices. The Guild had given members a challenge to make a block inspired by the Blue Bird Foundation logo with a blue theme, the blocks to be collected and made into a charity guilt to be donated on completion.

Show and Tell is always amazing and there were lots of "oohs and aahs" at the work of our talented and creative members. Some were projects done in



workshops, gifts for beloved family members and various quilts for charity groups and comfort quilts. There was a show of the Kawandi sample quilts made by Guild members from the Irene Blanck workshop.

We enjoyed Judith Oke's (The President of the Victorian Quilters) presentation of some of the entries in last year's showcase. These stunning quilts known as the Travelling Suitcase are the results of the Re-use, Re-cycle and Re-Create challenge. These quilts were lovingly made from upcycled fabrics, tea towels, all hand & machine sewn, appliqued and embroidered

After lunch our Guest speaker was Véronique Diligent of Wattlebird design, who gave a wonderful presentation of her amazing and diverse work and took us on her quilting journey. Véronique, originally from Switzerland, has been living in Melbourne since 1988 was funny, informative and friendly. She loves fabric, mixing and matching and embellishes her work with beading, lace, doilies, upcycled motifs, embroidery and applique. She was very generous with her time afterwards and it was great to be able to see her creations up close. She told us of her inspirations from an op shop trivet, to an antique quilt from 1824 to Bunnings Hardware store. Her final words were borrowed from an article she read many years ago. How long does it take to make?

It's long.... it's wonderful.... and it's worth it.... \emptyset

There were lots of prizes and give aways during the day many of which were donated by our generous Traders. Many different quilting groups attended including the Bellarine Quilters who were represented by almost 30 members as well as The Sea Change Quilters, Regent Street and Purple Pixies. All these ladies believe in the gift of giving and putting a smile on someone's face with the love shown in their quilts.




So start planning-remember there will be prizes!!!





40 YEARS



Our Ruby Anniversary year, 40 years to belong to a group is a very long time! I was there on that 1st day. We all know how the Guild came into existence as it is printed in our newsletter every month. My own personal experience was one of wanting to learn patchwork and quilting. I already knew how to make dresses, kids clothes, knit and crochet but patchwork was something else.

I met Heather Strauss at Matthew Flinders College at a log cabin workshop she was teaching and I was keen to learn, I still have that faded worn out cushion cover I made, it was the beginning of something big for me. There I met up with Glenys Russell who also became a Guild member.

Heather and I became firm friends, she invited me to her wedding to her 2nd husband, Frank Gommersall. We used to travel to exhibitions, she was always the judge of the quilts. Heather taught me such a lot about basic patchwork, measure twice and cut once. We didn't have cutting boards or large rulers or rotary cutters, it was a tape measure and good pair of scissors.

The Bicentennial was a big event for our guild when we became involved in helping to make a big banner. We were given the third letter I in Exhibition and made a big piece depicting the Market Square. With help from Guild members and Bellarine Quilters we did it. I was lucky enough to go to Australia's first Quilt Symposium, held on campus of the University of New England in Armidale NSW. It was run by Quilters and Patchworkers of New England Inc. and was held for three weeks and I managed to get a spot for one week in April 1988 involving lectures by international teachers, gala dinners, fashion parades. Over 300 quilters and tutors and administrators were there.

Workshops by Pauline Burbridge [UK] very contemporary, Sharyn Craig [USA] incredible stars, Fiona Gavens [NSW] land-scapes, Jan Myers[USA] traditional and Yvonne Porcella [USA] clothing. Over 20 tutors from overseas as well as our Australian tutors. Very overwhelming for this beginner patchworker! I found another friend Debra Brearly, who was the only one from Guild who attended. It was an eye opener for me to see the possibilities of what patchwork could be in the future for me.

In 1990 I married Ron, my 2nd husband. I invited some of my patchworkers friends to my wedding including Heather and her husband Frank. Very happy times for myself and Ron and we shared a blended family. Because of Ron's work we moved to Ballarat and was invited to join the Begonia Quilters who were an amazing group of 17 ladies [never more than 17]. We met every Wednesday in our homes for a whole school term. Gail Maklin would turn up with the latest books and fabrics. They were a very innovative creative group, we had a lot of fun. Jackets were made for a challenge and we invited Tina Banitska from The Convent Gallery in Daylesford to be the judge.

Because of work we moved to Cobram where I joined a very new small group, Cobram Quilters Club. Every month I would receive our Common thread newsletter and shared it with the Cobram ladies who even started to make the blocks illustrated in the newsletter. I maintained my full Guild membership and would return to meetings when I visited family.

In the late 90's Ron and I returned to Geelong and settled in Leopold. It was then possible to attend the Guild on a regular basis and the Bellarine Quilters were also in full swing, which was lovely as I started the group with 3 others who are no longer there in 1986/87.

The Guild has always been a big part of my life especially in the early days when I was a single mum with three young teenagers and working full time. It helped me to relax, be creative and make good friends. I was on committee when I was able and helped whenever I could. One of the best things I liked were our guest speakers, the ever increasing library and the challenges. I did most of the challenges and even gave some away as presents, but I still have a lot in a drawer somewhere. The Guild was always my go to for inspiration and friendship.

I may be getting older but I still enjoy meetings and look forward to monthly meetings and catching up with friends. May it long continue. Happy sewing ladies!

Thoughts on why I joined GPAQG







Quilt In Guest Speaker

Veronique Diligent

Veronique was a very entertaining and witty guest speaker at Quilt In. Born in Geneva, Switzerland, where quilting is not a traditional pastime, Veronique did not learn about quilting until she moved to Melbourne. She took to applique immediately and her first quilts reflect how much she enjoyed this technique. Later she took a class for "clam shells" taught by Irene Blanck, which led her to designing "Pele Mele" (which roughly translates to Higgledy Piggledy). Veronique encourages the use of anything you may have tucked away at the back of your cupboard (doilies, tea towels, tablecloths) as well as various techniques for this quilt. Having fun is what it is all about and enjoying the process.





Veronique's ability to combine applique and embroidery into her designs has led to some incredibly beautiful patterns (one of which I may have purchased).

After showing some of her amazing quilts, she enthralled us with the tale of her daughter's wedding dress, which she was to make and embroider on. Upon near completion, her daughter announced "Mum, I'm pregnant!" Last minute adjustment had to be made but it was completed for the big day. And Veronique added that she was now the grandmother of a ten day old baby boy.

She finished up by reading an article from a magazine which tries to answer that often asked question....

How Long Did That Take?

I find myself reflecting on the most common question quilters are asked about their work whenever it is shown-How long did that take? I rarely keep track of the number of hours that go into the making of a quilt. Watching the clock and keeping tabs on my quilting makes it seem like work. Even though I make my living with my quiltmaking and teaching. I want the quilting time to be relaxing and enjoyable. But still, the question continues.

It would be simple, perhaps, to answer in calendar time. I made it in a week, or it took six months, or I worked on it for years. But with several quilts in progress all of the time and pieces overlapping (or resting), this is not a very accurate measure of the work involved.

Years ago, in an effort to answer this question and to make the point to a group of nonquilters. I used this analogy: I quilt an average of ten stitches to the inch and I used a little more than two and one half spools of thread in this quilt. There are 250 yards of thread on a spool so that would be about 700 yards of thread in this quilt. If you want to consider how long that would take...imagine quilting ten stitches every inch, along the full length of a football field seven times.

Or...even more interesting and perhaps more obsessive...how many stitches are in the quilt? Again, beginning with the figure of ten stitches to the inch and considering a few inches last in knot and tails, a reasonable figure would be ten times 30 inches or 300 stitches made from each yard of thread. I know that I put between two and five spools of thread into my large quilts; let's take an average of three spools, times 250 yards or 750 yards of thread. Multiplying the 750 yards times 300 stitches per yard will give us the grand total of 225,000 stitches per quilt. Nearly a quarter million!

Multiply that times the number of quilts that have been made by you. by your friends, by quilters around the world. The answers will be staggering!

I've heard it suggested that the time it takes to finish a quilt should be measured from the time one first learned how to quilt. Every quilt teaches us something, develops a new skill, a fresh approach, a better appreciation for this art we love. And this new quilt is the culmination of all that we know right now.

How long did it take? Any way you measure it, it's long, it's wonderful, and it's worth it.


