I am really looking forward to seeing the results of this one – I know we have extremely talented and creative members – there will be some very exciting pieces on display! There will be a viewers' choice prize as well as a prize chosen by our 'secret' judge.

Deb Read, our Treasurer, and I visited the One Step Further Exhibition at the Old Auction House Gallery in Kyneton this month. This exhibition, organised by Victorian Quilters, aims to stimulate quilters to think outside the box, and create a 'quilt' that challenges traditional construction methods, that stretches design ideas and tickles the imagination in all directions. The exhibition certainly offered a wide variety of skills, ideas, and creative interpretations of themes. There were all sorts of materials used from greaseproof paper to silk organza, along with various dyeing techniques from ice dyeing to eco dyeing. Designs were largely abstract with the makers' statements telling a story of what had inspired their work. I have to be honest and say not all the pieces appealed to me, but some were fascinating. I particularly loved 'Cicada 2' by Julie-Anne Rogers, a three dimensional work where Julie-Anne had used fabric, woven steel, wire, thread, paint and paint sticks and glue to create the design. (Pictured) Our Guild was heavily represented with four members having their pieces on display – congratulations to Jan Preston, Betty Scott, Lyn Weeks and Judith Oke for their inspiring entries.



I'm sure many of you will remember Lyn Weeks' talk last year, about her workshop in Japan with Brian Whitehead. It has inspired several of our members to participate in this gentleman's workshop in Japan this month. I am very jealous as I'm sure they are all having a fascinating time, learning about traditional Japanese dyeing techniques in a beautiful rural setting. I will miss their presence at our meeting – but no doubt there will be some wonderful show and tell items coming up in the future.

This reminds me, I would love to know how many of you would be interested in a one day workshop on curved piecing – please let me know if you would like to learn more about how to put together beautifully pieced curved blocks. If you have any other ideas of what you would be keen to do in a one day workshop, I would love to hear them.

I am looking forward to this month's speaker, Veronique Diligent, from Wattlebird Designs, and to seeing you all at the meeting on 19th October.

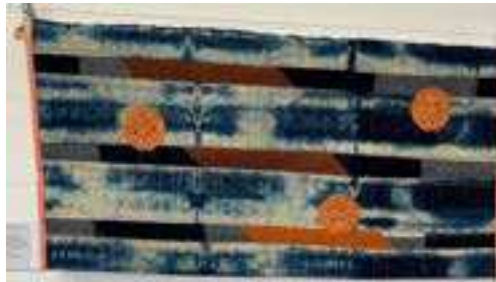

October Guest Speaker

Veronique Diligent

Our guest speaker this month is Veronique Diligent



A fertile imagination couple with the ability to "draw anything" are the basis of her creative endeavours.

Quilt making is not a traditional craft in Switzerland where she was born. It was not until she first lived in Melbourne that she became aware of quilt making. A neighbour had introduced her to a sewing group where she was initially exposed to teddy bear making and appliqué. Veronique was smitten and since that time has become immersed in the making of quilts.

She loves fabrics and often finds it difficult to work with a particular range and style, preferring to mix and match.

As an embroiderer Veronique is very attracted to Australian flora and its stunning colours, often using it as a guidance when looking for a specific combination of colours. And her love of the native flora drew the attention of Cottage Garden Threads, a thread company locally based. Their collaboration resulted in a range of 29 colours combinations called "Feathers and Petals".

Veronique will be having a pop up shop at the meeting. She can accept card payments but would welcome cash.

Mystery Quilt—Instalment 3

Now that you have made your 12 Road to Oklahoma and 13 Double X blocks, you will piece them together in 5 rows of 5 alternating blocks.

Using Photo 1 and Photo 2 as your guide, your first row should have 3 Double X blocks and 2 Road to Oklahoma blocks alternating and with alternate 'directions' of the two block types.



Your second row uses 3 Road to Oklahoma and 2 Double X blocks alternating and keeping the direction of each block type constant as per Photo 3



Make 3 more rows, as above, with the final one being of 3 Double X and 2 Road to Oklahoma blocks.



Sew your rows together to create your quilt centre. It should measure 40 ½ Inches square at this point. (Photo 4)

Choose a dark fabric (one you have already used in the blocks if you have enough, or an alternative one) that you have sufficient quantity of to cut and sew a 2 inch simple framing border around this centre piece. (NO photo for this step).

I will give you my suggestion for the remaining border for this quilt in the final Instalment next month. In saying this, you may choose to add whatever design of border you like to finish this quilt to the size you want. My suggestion will bring the finished quilt top size to approx.. 56 - 60" square. If you want to keep the border cohesive, you may prefer to use the same fabric as in the first 2 inch border for a second later border. Or you could choose to use one or more of your other dark fabrics that are in the centrepiece. I'm keeping you guessing about the border as this 'mystery' quilt .. because so far, it's been an easy construct for you. Plus I will be interested to see if any of you choose (as Rae Sharpe did with Mystery Quilt 1) to create your own interesting border for this one.

Have fun... and contact me if you have any questions or if my instructions are too confusing!

AUSSIE HERO QUILTS

Sue Palmer

Aussie Heroes has been up and running since January 2012. Aussie Hero Quilts (and Laundry Bags) has continued to grow steadily.

These days quilts and laundry bags are mailed mostly

Quilt Size:

The quilts were designed to be portable and easy to post. Anything posted to the members with an AFPO address and under 2kg is free.

Aussie Hero Quilts are sized to be the width of the fabric so about 42". The length should be 70". I know some of you will think that this size seems a little narrow, but the quilts also have to be small enough for the recipients to fit into their luggage if they are required to move from one location to another unexpectedly. They also need to be the right size to fit on top of a navy bunk at sea and a bunk bed or stretcher on land. If you make the quilts too wide this makes them too big and bulky.

Every Quilt must have an Aussie Hero label on it as follows:

This is an
AUSSIE HERO QUILT
Made for an Aussie Hero .

If Aussie Hero Quilts is something you would like to get involved with speak to Sue Palmer. The Aussie Hero Quilts website is very comprehensive with tutorials available on how to make quilt blocks and also quilt patterns.

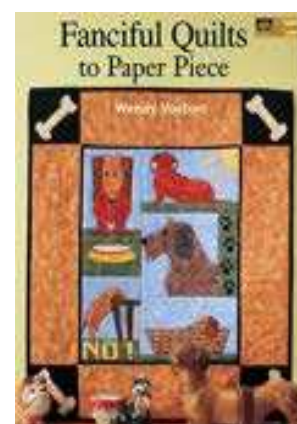

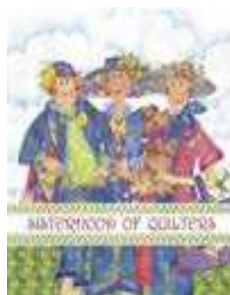
