I will write a separate little report on that further into the newsletter. Her Civic Duty as the 1<sup>st</sup> female Shire President and then Mayor of the shire of Barwon was another string to her bow as were many more areas of interest including the CFA.

Margaret's life long interest in all forms of stitching, embroidery and crafts led her into a passion of Patchwork & Quilting, joining the Geelong Patchwork and Quilters' Guild, forming new friendships and teaching. Margaret contributed to the 2015 Johnston Collection with her Mariners Compass Quilt and was 'very' prolific in making 'many' quilts & donating to charity. She was also very humble in winning Awards with her beautiful variations of large quilts through Victorian Quilters.

Her friendships were very extensive, always an entertaining personality and as Molly her daughter said: An Elegant Dame....who has left a lasting legacy.

I'm not sure how many ladies were there but it would have been in the vicinity of 140 -150. I know there was a waiting list for the event,

which booked out quite quickly. Four traders were in the 'house' so plenty to tempt us to open our purses. I was quick to pounce on a piece of white felt I needed for a current project, amongst other small purchases. For once I was relatively restrained, despite temptation. The Colac Quilters organising committee had set up a long table of raffle prizes - all carefully wrapped as mystery items, so the lucky ladies didn't know what treasures they had won, which was fun. Sadly I was not one of them....

We had a speech from a representative from the local branch of the Salvation Army, (the

chosen charity for the day) in which he described the work they did with the many unfortunate people in the region who were struggling not only with financial constraints, often leading to coming in for a decent meal, but also with severe lack of water in their tanks, needing to bring in loads of washing they couldn't do in their farmhouses, or to have a much needed shower. The drought is affecting the farming community in our western district so badly, crops are failing, dairy herds are having to be sold off because there is no feed for them – they are doing it very tough. It brought home to me how bad things are so close to home.

Later there were 2 speakers - the first being Emma Jean Jansen who talked about her quilting journey and showed many of her quilts

for which she has patterns that she sells online. The 2<sup>nd</sup> being Jodie Carleton of <a href="https://www.jodiericrac.com">www.jodiericrac.com</a>. Jodie was very amusing (with some fruity language for which she was most unapologetic!!) in discussing her toy making business and how it came about, sending many of her most popular toys around the room for us to admire. Patterns for her toys can be bought on that website.

It was a lovely day, which I was happy to spend with my cousin (a Colac Quilter) and seeing how another group conducts their Quilt In. I will certainly go again.



#### My Quilting Journey with the Guild

My journey with the Guild began in the late 1980s after I visited a quilting shop located in the Wintergardens and what a wonderful journey it has been. I attended some classes at the shop and found out about the Guild.

In 2005 my husband was offered a position in Queensland where we lived for ten years. But was I prepared to give up being part of the Guild – No. During that time I retained my membership, flying back to attend the great retreats which were held and took the opportunity to attend meetings and Quilt-Ins whenever we were in Victoria. I still continued to enjoy my quilting and joined a sewing group which met weekly at one of the shops in Brisbane. Each month I eagerly awaited the arrival of the Guild newsletter in the mail so that I could catch up on what had happened and what was planned to happen.

2015 saw us move back to Victoria, we built our home and I was able to come to Guild meetings again. I decided that I not only wanted to be a member but wanted to be on the Committee, to be involved with the organising of meetings and events to enhance members experiences with the Guild.

#### SKILL SHARING DEMONSTRATIONS

I was asked to be the roving reporter for the Skill Building Demonstrations at the June meeting, so armed with my trusty pen and paper I spent time at each of the demonstration centres. There were five tables set up where members demonstrated various skills including preparing a quilt using pool noodles, making a flanged binding, hand applique, drafting a block and machine applique.



Christine Fox and Margaret Page demonstrated preparing a quilt using pool noodles. This entails pinning the top, backing and batting on separate noodles using flat pins. Each layer was pinned to the noodle, smoothing the fabric along the noodle as you roll. It is essential to establish a smooth working surface.









Nicola Picken and Anna Schroeter were at the flange binding station. Nicola had her sewing machine set up to show how to attach the binding to the quilt. She had a handout which gave typed instructions with a small example so that members could create their own binding. Such a pretty way to finish the binding on a quilt.











Sue May was demonstrating hand applique techniques at her station. She showed how to create templates using vellum, marking the designs on fabric using a chalk pen, turning a corner, her stitching technique and using a design board.











Anne Clutterbuck, at her station, demonstrated drafting block patterns on  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch marked graph paper using a ruler, compass and set squares. She showed how she creates her own blocks on the paper. Then when she has finished she creates the quilt layout by colouring the blocks using pencils.





Carole Bosna demonstrated her way of machine applique. She spoke about the different methods she uses including creating stitches by weaving threads around the sewing machine needle whilst sewing and the different threads which are available to create different textures. She also spoke about how she does free motion threading painting with a loose bobbin thread.









Each of the stations had several members gathered around during the demonstrations, lots of questions were being asked and as such I am sure that other members would have not only have gleaned some useful information but enjoyed the afternoon as much as I did.

Thank you to all the ladies who willingly shared their knowledge and skills.




