

Notice of The Annual General Meeting of the Geelong Patchwork & Quilters Guild

to be held on Saturday 16th August 2025.

The purpose of the AGM is twofold. First is a review of the year past, with the President delivering her report on the year's activities and the direction for the group, and the Treasurer presenting the Annual financial report. Second purpose is to elect a committee to steer the Guild for the coming twelve months.

We are seeking nominations from members to serve on the committee for the period August 2025 to July 2026. This is not an onerous job and provides members with an opportunity to participate in the running and direction of the Guild, and to get to know more of the members. The Committee generally meets at the close of our regular Guild days, and by and large there is not a lot of business involved. Our major events most years are our Quilt In, the Biggest Morning Tea, and a bi-ennial Exhibition.

PRESIDENTS REPORT



Hello everyone,

Here we are at another AGM for the Guild – this year for me has gone way too fast. I will write an Annual President's Report separately, which you will find elsewhere in this newsletter. In this one I'm talking about just this past few weeks of activity.

Firstly, may I say a huge thankyou to all the members who came to our July Biggest Morning Tea meeting and, not only brought along a record amount of items for the silent auction, but were generous to a fault in supporting our aim to raise as much money as we could for the Cancer Council to help further that organisation's aims and progammes. We raised the wonderful sum of \$1435, our biggest sum from the past 3 years, and I'm delighted with that result. \$1164 from the Silent auction, \$90 in cash donations from some very generous members, and \$181 from the Raffle. Well done to each and every one of you for all that you contributed to this fantastic effort. I am so proud of you all. I think the decorated bras added a little lighthearted humour to the day and congratulations to those ladies who accepted that challenge and were brave enough to wear their creations in the parade. Congratulations to Sue Palmer for taking out the Judge's choice for best decorated. Thankyou all for participating in my two quizzes – congratulations to the teams who took home the chocolates for those events, and well done to everyone for getting into the spirit with decorating tables or wearing pink or yellow. I hope you all enjoyed the day – it is a bit different and the cause is close to so many hearts.

I distributed a lot of paper patterns for the 40th Birthday celebratory leaf that the committee is hoping most of you will create. If you are going to make a leaf, don't forget to make it very personal – using fabrics you love, embroidering or appliqueing details that make it personal but also reference the 40 figure or the Guild's history in some way. Be creative. I'm looking forward to seeing them all in September and ultimately connected into a bunting that will be used as part of the 'Ruby' Exhibition in October.

Speaking of which, are you all working on a quilt that will be entered or on the Ruby Challenge? Don't forget we need the Challenge entries to be brought to the October meeting so the members and 3 of our Life Members can judge their favourites. There will be 3 individual Judge's Choice winners, and one Members' Choice winner – these will be announced at the opening of the Exhibition in October. Time is flying - it will be September and October before we know it. Come and see me at the August meeting if you need a pattern for the leaf, I will print off a few more just in case.



We have just held our second workshop of the year – the Kathy Doughty "Into the Wild" or Organic Applique 2 day workshop. 21 ladies participated, 15 members, and 6 ladies from other quilt guilds. There will be a detailed report on this very popular workshop elsewhere in the newsletter with more photos. I first approached Kathy to do a workshop with us at AQC in 2023, so it has taken over 2 years to get Kathy here to teach her method of applique and enthuse us all with her ideas on fabric and design. Her calendar is always so full it took that long to find a weekend that worked for her. It was a very successful workshop that everyone who attended loved. Because we can't have the Newcomb Hall on Sundays, it was held in Drysdale Senior Citizens Hall, a venue that worked extremely well. I must thank Dianne White who is heavily involved in Senior Citizens and the running of that Hall, most sincerely for her assistance, and a big thankyou also to Chris Fox, Anne Millward, and Jill Ward along with Dianne for getting the hall set up for us on the Friday before. It made such a difference to me to have all this assistance, and made it easy for the participants to just come along and get settled in for 2 days of intense learning and creating.

Of course, this coming meeting is our AGM. So far, I've had no-one submit any nominations for executive positions on the Committee – I really hope that we don't have the situation where no-one is willing to step up and participate in the running of the Guild. It cannot be emphasized enough that the Guild will be shut down if we cannot get an executive together to carry on past this next meeting. I know many of you have been on the committee in the past but that may be a couple of decades ago. Some of you have committee involvements in other quilt groups and are not willing to also take on the Guild and I can understand that. But there must be ladies amongst you who can find a bit of time each month to help form the committee. We particularly need a secretary and a treasurer at this stage, and a Vice President as well. Without those three positions filled we cannot function. It's really time I stepped aside but I will nominate to continue as President if no-one else steps up. Please, I am entreating you, if you love the Guild and want it to continue, that you will come forward at the AGM and nominate to take a role.

I will see you all on August 16th - I'm looking forward to hearing our guest speaker, Andrea Taylor of Bittern by the Bug – a specialist in Japanese Sashiko and Japanese fabrics – don't forget to bring along your Sashiko quilts and items, or quilts with a Japanese theme for Show and Tell. And I'm looking forward to establishing a new committee to carry the Guild into 2026...

I was invited to join the table where other Ocean Grove women were sitting. I had a lovely time and instantly became a Guild member. I also joined Stitchers at Sea which is a perfect friendship group for me.

My first quilt may have been a traditional one but by experimenting and always being keen to try new approaches, I have become an art quilter. There is something for everyone in the quilting world.

I have been a member for more than 20 years. For those of you who are new to the Guild and don't know me, I have been President twice, and convened the Guild Exhibition five times, both at Deakin Waterfront and Geelong West Town Hall.

So why did I stay?

I love the highlights such as the exhibition, quilt in, guest speakers, show and tell, library; and who can forget the fun of the Bus Shopping Trips?

Most importantly, I enjoy the personal friendships I have made, along with the positive vibe of our monthly meetings.

President's Report from August 2024 to July 2025 inclusive.

The Geelong Patchwork & Quilters' Guild Inc has prospered again this past year. We can say that we have recovered financially from the devastating effects of the Covid Pandemic and have maintained a healthy bank balance while at the same time expanding our events and making the year full of interest. Some of the important points to note for this past year:

- 1. Membership was kept to the same cost as it has been for over a decade now, and meeting costs were also kept to the same level as the past few years.
- 2. We have had more paid speakers than we have had for a few years, which has given the members a lot to learn, to enjoy, to talk about. The list of speakers in the past 12 months is:
 - a. Gail Jorgens, Geelong Show Homecraft Co-ordinator.
 - b. Shirley Drayton Textile Artist with thread painting and involvement with the Aussie Hero programme.
 - c. Veronique Diligent in October and also as our much admired Guest Speaker at our May Quilt In
 - lovely applique, loves Australian plants.
 - d. Ruth Nunn of the Lions Club of Quilters, Victoria Australian Quilt Collection
 - showed us some of the main pieces and how they're stored for permanency
 - e. Irene Blanck with her wonderful applique guilts and Kawandi techniques
 - f. Sonya Else brought her extraordinary mandala quilts and landscape quilts featuring Australian animals, birds and plants.
 - g. Tara Glastonbury with a selection of her modern quilts and a very professional presentation touching on, among other things, repurposing clothing

You would have to agree, that is a very diverse list of speakers with special talents – and the members need to thank both Margaret Tembo (23-24 Vice President) and Sue Palmer, (24-25 Vice President) for this list. It is the role of the Vice President to organise the monthly speakers. Sue has already arranged the next few months with some exciting speakers to come.

- 3. We have held 2 very popular workshops very different in nature.
 - a. Irene Blanck's Kawandi technique workshop -a one day affair held at Newcomb Hall and very much enjoyed by those who attended it. Some excellent examples of that workshop should be available for the upcoming Exhibition.
 - b. Kathy Doughty's Organic Applique workshop a 2 day affair held at Drysdale Senior Citizens and very highly rated by the 21 participants hopefully some of those pieces will be ready for the exhibition as well.
- 4. In place of a speaker we had the Shared Skills meeting in June where 5 members talked about one particular skill that the members could watch in demonstrations, ask questions, add to their skill repertoires. This is a different day for members, but always well received and quite often asked for.
- 5. Our annual Quilt In at Geelong West Town Hall attracted the biggest attendance we've had since pre-pandemic times and was a great success. Veronique was heavily praised for her work, her humour and her generosity of time to those who wanted answers to their questions about her work. We had an appearance by representatives of the Blue Bird Foundation choir sing to us. We raised \$1183 in fundraising for that Foundation through raffles and the guessing competition, which was most appreciated by the people at Bluebird Foundation. As in the previous 2 years, there were over 30 Challenge blocks made with the Bluebird theme, which will be made into 2 quilts, one of which will be given to the Bluebird Foundation for them to raise further funds. The traders were very popular and also very happy with their day a good day was had by all, except those stuck at the back of the hall!!
- 6. The July Biggest Morning Tea meeting another fund raising day this time through the silent auction and special raffle. A happy day very relaxed with a couple of quizzes, and the noteworthy decorated bra parade giving rise to some giggles. With \$1435 raised for the Cancer Council's work, it was our biggest donation for the past 3 years and a testament to the generosity of the members.

The Christmas meeting had Judy Bubb's annual challenge where we were given a hoop to decorate with a Flora and Fauna theme. The display of hoops was so absorbing – so many ideas, such a lot of talented workmanship.

Of course, members have continued to be so giving of their time and talents in making quilts for others - the Snuggly Quilt Programme, and Sexual Assault and Family Violence Centre receiving dozens of quilts. My thanks to all of you who quietly go along making quilts for these two services, with special thanks going to our irreplaceable matriarch of the Snuggly Quilts – Judy Alcock.

President's Report (continued)

Later this year we will be staging our Biennial Quilt Exhibition at the Geelong West Town Hall – to that purpose a special sub-committee was set up to organise the event, and my thanks go to Nicola Picken for agreeing to be the Convenor, and to all those committee members, most of whom organised and ran the previous Exhibition – Pam Planner, Bronwyn Drehlich, Heather Grant, Carole Bosna, and Deb Read. We wish them every success with the Exhibition and remind all members to work on the Ruby Challenge project, which will be part of the display.

We congratulate all of our members who had had success in the past year, with entries into Showcase or staging their own exhibitions (Lyn Weeks, Jan Preston, Judith Oke,, Margaret Tembo, Carole Bosna, Pam Planner and Bronwyn Drehlich) Apologies to anyone I have overlooked here. Our Guild holds so much talent within the membership and I encourage all members to push their boundaries with their work – to keep learning and trying different techniques.

Of course, it is our 40th birthday as a Guild coming up in September, and the members have been reminded regularly that this year is a special one for that reason – hence the Ruby Challenge. We plan to celebrate with a birthday party in September - with the planning for that well underway.

This year we have sadly lost some of our older members, which always hurts, but we have also been fortunate to have gained some new members that we welcome very willingly. The Guild will need to constantly renew itself to stay relevant and contemporary. To those who have joined us this year, I hope you have found it rewarding and will find it easy to make new friends and enjoy your time spent in our quilting community.

I cannot finish this report without thanking my brilliant committee -

- Sue Palmer, Vice President for someone who thought she didn't know enough contacts to do the job you have done a phenomenal job of organising our speakers.
- Cheryl Gilbert, secretary extraordinaire so good with the agendas and minutes so comprehensively presented and the person who keeps me on my toes best.
- Deb Read the best treasurer I've ever worked with on any committee (and believe me I've been on quite a few –not all guild ones!) such wonderful attention to detail, such cleanly kept records.
- Judy Bubb our librarian and membership secretary two jobs that she does so very well always has time to talk to me, always so willing to give of herself to this Guild.
- Jodie Arklay our Web site manager dealing with external pressures, child raising, studying and yet still doing so much to keep our website up to date and keep the members informed with special emails.

Andrea Taylor


My name is Andrea Taylor and I have been stitching and teaching in the "Japanese" style of Sashiko and "Boro" for about 20 years and have been a dressmaker for around 40 years. I also indigo dye using an organic recipe vat.

Sashiko and Boro seem to be the techniques which I find I can create and be my most creative in. I have always tutored the traditional way of transferring Sashiko patterns with Chaco paper to fabric, as I have always believed that it has given me the most creative freedom with my designs. Many of my designs are developed by myself from copyright free Japanese books my son brought back from his many visits to Japan. I was lucky enough to visit Japan in 2015 to see the Tokyo Quilt Show, an amazing spectacle.

Recently I have branched out and have included my own screen printed and Lino cut printed designs to incorporate with Sashiko and Boro, giving another dimension to my work.

Now with the inclusion of slow stitching on everyone's "radar", Sashiko, the ultimate and most elegant of slow stitching styles, can hopefully take its rightful place as a technique to learn and love as I have for many years.

Andrea will be having a pop up shop at the August meeting.



Your entry form is to be accompanied by a colour photo of the quilt

Every quilt needs to be in its own quilt bag that is labelled with your name and phone number as well as the name of the quilt.

Your entry quilt needs to be labelled on the back with your name and the name of the quilt Please make sure all of your quilts have a 10cm hanging sleeve attached.

Only quilts completed in the last two years are eligible for entry

If needed instructions for making a quilt bag can be found on the VicQuilters website.

Challenge

Our Committee would love you to create a quilted piece with your interpretation of our theme RUBY!

It's up to you how you use the theme of Ruby. We have very creative members so I look forward to seeing your completed pieces.

So here's what you need to know: Finished size 40 x 40 centimetres.

3 layers quilted together.

Edges can be bound, raw or faced.

10cm hanging sleeve on the back.

Name and title of your piece on the back.

Bring them to our October meeting on Saturday October 18th in a quilt bag.

Following this meeting the Challenges will be collected and kept for display at our Exhibition the following week.





The Exhibition Committee invites members to make and sell items at the Exhibition. The items will need to be priced beforehand by the creator and the appropriate form to be filled in. The items need to be patchwork/craft related. Members who wish to sell items will be required to help on the stall during the Exhibition. The Guild will retain 10% of the sale price of the items sold. Same applies if you wish to place a "for Sale" sign on a quilt on display at the Exhibition.

Kathy Doughty - Organic Applique Workshop.

Saturday 26 and Sunday 27 July 2025

21 eager Quilters poured into the Drysdale Senior Citizens Hall at 9.30am on Saturday 26th July to begin the 2 day Organic Applique workshop taught by Kathy Doughty of Material Obsession in Sydney. We had waited many months for this workshop so expectations were high and not one of us was disappointed. 15 Guild members, and 6 ladies from other groups were set up with a table each in the very well lit hall. Eight ironing stations were set up in a room behind the kitchen which made it very convenient for all. The generous people of the Senior Citizens supplied tea/coffee and an unexpected bonus of cake, fruit and some brownies to make morning tea very appealing!





Kathy began by talking about her history in quilting and her preferred methods of designing, and fabric choices, whilst showing several examples of her applique quilts. She then moved on to her method of creating applique pieces using wash away paper and fabric glue pens or 'Best Press' (or equivalent) with demonstrations using both that we could all gather round and see.

After this initial talk and demonstration we all began to create leaves or flowers using the wash away paper and stems using the 'Best Press' method – both so simple yet so useful - forget those bias tape makers and even the Roxanne glue that sets as plastic! The level of concentration and enthusiasm in the room was very catching – everyone so buoyed by learning a new and easy technique... Progress on many applique pieces for budding quilts was rapid. Kathy was impressed with the amount of progress

being made by our committed group. After the lunch break, Kathy showed us her two methods of creating perfect circles for her quilts using Applipops or cardboard or mylar templates with alfoil – both new to me at least! The ladies were more excited again about seeing these techniques demonstrated. Then back to work on

our own pieces until 4pm.



Sunday saw everyone pile into the room and immediately set about setting up their quilts on design walls or on their tables using the pieces created the day before, or continue making pieces. One more demonstration from Kathy of her stitching technique before a brief Show & Tell, lots more work on individual projects and lots of chat. Kathy was always moving around the room, encouraging us, talking about choices, ideas, improvements etc. Around 3pm most packed up and prepared to leave, being tired but exhilarated by all that we had seen and learnt in 2 days. It will be interesting to see how many of those projects will be finished in time to be shown at our October Exhibition. A great workshop – worth waiting so long to have! Kudos to Kathy Doughty for being such a good teacher and so generous with her time and ideas.


Biggest Morning Tea








August Library Report




