The Lions Club of Quilters Victoria has been developing the Australian Quilt and Textile Collection (AQTC) since 2011, with the principle objective of capturing our cultural, artistic and social history through textiles.

- Introduces unique and brilliant Australian quilt artists

### PRESIDENTS REPORT



Hello Ladies,

This will be briefer than usual as I have little to report that you haven't already heard!

But I did go to the Bellarine Quilters Quilt Show on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> Oct at Drysdale Senior Citizens Centre. It was buzzing with people when I was there in the early afternoon, with plenty of Bellarine Quilters there to man the excellent trading table (where I spent quite a bit of money!) and to look after the visitors to the exhibition. Clearly Dianne White has been very busy making bags — there was such a variety of them there... I am not sure who won the Viewer's Choice or who won the raffle quilts (not me sadly). It was interesting to see the quilts made in a challenge using equilateral triangles — such different approaches to that requirement. Well done to the group, they put on a lovely exhibition showcasing their skills. It behoves me to remind you all that we are now only 12 months away from our next Exhibition and I really hope that all of you will produce at least one quilt or patchwork item to go into our quilt show in 2025.





I haven't had many ladies showing interest in participating in the full one day workshop with Judy Alcock - dealing with mastering curved piecing. Think of all the wonderful patterns that use curves that you could be creating if you had sound training in how to perfect the sewing of curves – either slight or deep. At \$80 for a full day it is not an expensive workshop – we were charging this price 4 years ago for one day workshops. Judy is an excellent instructor (being a retired teacher helps of course!) – I know I gained a lot of confidence when I took part in a Drunkard's Path workshop with her some years ago. Please let me know if you're interested in doing the workshop.

I am hoping too to get more suggestions from you all for workshops in the future. I know several of you showed great interest in having Veronique do one and I have taken that on board. But we are already committed to the Kathy Doughty 2 day 'Organic Applique' workshop in July, so I won't be asking Veronique to do another applique workshop next year... however I will look to having her take one in 2026. I am nearing having enough ladies registered for the Kathy Doughty workshop, which is great, but there are still some spaces if you decide you would like to learn her techniques and be inspired by her ideas. If you don't know Kathy's work – do have a look in the Library for her book on 'Organic Applique' and her work in the 2 Material Obsession books.

Next month is our Christmas meeting – I will be busy devising what fun and games we can get up to at that meeting. Don't forget you must pay for your Christmas boxed lunch at this coming meeting in November so I can advise our caterers of definite numbers. We are a bit down on numbers compared to the last 2 years but it is certainly OK for you to bring your own lunch if that's what you prefer. You will need to bring your singing voices as well – just a hint! We can welcome back our Japanese workshop participants – no doubt they will have plenty to relate of their adventures and their learning.


Looking forward to hearing our November speaker, Ruth Nunn of the Lions Club of Victoria & Australian Quilt Collection should be inspiring.

### Recycle, Upcycle, Redesign and Reuse

The current buzz words for crafty people are Recycle, Upcycle, Redesign and Reuse. In my upbringing they were not buzz words but actions that happened in ordinary day to day life. Yes my mother made bedspreads and curtains out of new fabric when we moved to our new home. She sewed our clothes but garments and household linen were reused and never thrown out when it was time to make new again (as curtains faded on windows and children grew). Mother washed but never allowed items to fade on the clothes line. My dolls were dressed in recycled material from my dresses I had grown out of while I learnt sewing making the doll's bed linen and clothes from my clothes. I had some lovely dresses handed down from cousins and make overs from adult family clothes. "Waste not want not" a catch phrase. Do you have a story of learning to sew as growing up?

We live in an age of Waste. Did you watch the ABC TV series on Waste which said that since the latter 20<sup>th</sup> century and now 21<sup>st</sup> production of clothes, linen and household equipment has developed the throw away society. Young girls were interviewed about their shopping habits which explained why Opshops have rows and rows of garments hardly worn or not worn at all, great fodder for recycling. Do you have a stash of items from Opshops or in your wardrobe for recycling into quilts, new garments and challenges like the recent VicQuilters July Showcase now in suitcase exhibition.



Here is my image for the VicQuilter challenge "Tropical Beauty", made from an Opshop sundress, tropical shirt, girl's summer skirt and trousers, also my orange blouse. Things I have noted about reusing fabric: Cotton is always the best, easiest fabric to reuse however be aware of the cut of garments and watch for the way it is cut across or straight or bias. The sundress was cut on bias to get the skirt to fall elegantly. The girl's skirt and trousers had a small 5% of elastin and that means stretch so sew with care or stabilise if in larger blocks however my use was easy being small borders and binding.

Varying thickness of fabrics in some items makes sewing heavy at corners and at seams. My handbag made from a child's skirt should have been embroidered before lining fully but I lined then decided to embroider,



eventually stuck butterflies on for decoration with a combination of machine and hand sewing. It was judged at Geelong Show a First Prize. However the butterflies are falling off and when you carry too much in the bag some stitching can come undone. Other Fabrics besides denim that I have had some experience of are: woollen suiting, felted cardigans, heavy brocade curtaining, linen, lace and silk. I usually stabilise soft fabrics (off cuts of Japanese silks, nylon and georgette soft fabrics).



My latest project was a new class on Geelong Show Schedule "A small quilt no more than 100cm by 100cm in recycled fabric".

It's title is "Blouses, Blossoms and Birds" It is made primarily from denim using both sides of the fabric. My own design gives a pattern of blocks in small floral from old blouses, large and small in denim. I had cut three pockets from denim skirts and overlaid the lace which was edging from a navy summer woman's top. As Skirts and Jeans only have two major pockets one of the pockets was a darker denim, which was ideal for the birds; the idea which came from the cover of Embellish Magazine (Editor Linda Worthington). The backing was cut from one of my table cloths no longer used. I received a First Place from the judges at 2024 show and was rewarded for trying an entry that was different.

Recycling is very rewarding and I have seen some other guild members contributions to recycle, upcycle, design and reuse. If you haven't tried it design your own project.





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# Mystery Quilt—Final Installment Anne Clutterbuck

I have spent hours trying to decide what to do with a border for this quilt... and am still not entirely happy with my choices, but it's done now and I'm not undoing it!! What I will say is that I recommend you choose your own individual style for a border and if that's a nice simple strip of fabric on all four sides that's great... the simple border is very often my preferred choice, but I tried to do something a bit interesting for this one. I thought of doing Flying Geese, various diamond patterns, or even a chevron pattern but settled for this. As it involved drafting pieces, it was more complex and I had to 'fudge' the final results a little to make everything fit... you will possibly need to do this as well.

For my border you will need:

- 1. 30cm WOF of one dark and one light fabric.
- 2. 20cm WOF of a second light fabric
- 3 30cm WOF of a second dark fabric
- 4. 1 metre of a third 'dark' or medium dark fabric needs to contrast with the other fabrics a bit.

You will also need a quantity of a fabric – perhaps the third dark or whatever you used to add the 2 inch border to the quilt middle

in 3<sup>rd</sup> instalment - to bind your quilt, and of course, whatever you have to create a backing.

Cut WOF strips 2  $\,$  inch wide of the first dark and first light fabric  $\,$  and sew as per PHOTO 1.


Cut those sewn strips in 2 inch pieces and sew into simple 9 patch blocks that should measure approx. 4 7/8 to 5 inches square PHOTO 2.

- make 14 blocks





Measure your quilt top from edge to edge - here is where you will need to be smart with cutting rectangles of your second light fabric - you will need 12 rectangles total and they should measure  $4\,7/8$  to  $5\,$  inch by approx.  $4\,$ % inches. Piece one of these rectangles between  $2\,$ x  $9\,$ patch blocks and create a row of  $7\,$ x nine patch blocks interspersed with the light rectangles as per PHOTO  $3\,$ 



Then attach your two rows of nine patches to the other two sides as per PHOTO 6

It took me some time to fudge these strips to match the width of the quilt top exactly, I was careful to cut wider rectangles than I thought I would really need so I could adjust the seaming when joining the 9 patches to the

rectangle so they fit the finished width of the top. This is mainly because I am not the world's greatest at drafting pieces, but with plain rectangles it was at least adjustable!

Finally cut a third border for all sides out of the metre your 3<sup>rd</sup> medium to dark fabric and sew to all sides as per PHOTO 7





Your quilt top is finished .... If you can follow these instructions and make it work you've done well!!! Thankyou to those of you who have decided to do the quilt – I will be keen to see your results. This will be last Mystery Quilt for some time. I'll come up with another idea for you all to challenge yourselves with next year.

# AUSSIE HERO QUILTS Sue Palmer

Aussie Heroes has been up and running since January2012 . Aussie Hero Quilts (and Laundry Bags) has continued to grow steadily.

These days quilts and laundry bags are mailed mostly

### **Quilt Size:**

The quilts were designed to be portable and easy to post. Anything posted to the members with an AFPO address and under 2kg is free.

Aussie Hero Quilts are sized to be the width of the fabric so about 42". The length should be 70". I know some of you will think that this size seems a little narrow, but the quilts also have to be small enough for the recipients to fit into their luggage if they are required to move from one location to another unexpectedly. They also need to be the right size to fit on top of a navy bunk at sea and a bunk bed or stretcher on land. If you make the quilts too wide this makes them too big and bulky.

Every Quilt must have an Aussie Hero label on it as follows:

This is an
AUSSIE HERO QUILT
Made for an Aussie Hero .

If Aussie Hero Quilts is something you would like to get involved with speak to Sue Palmer. The Aussie Hero Quilts website is very comprehensive with tutorials available on how to make quilt blocks and also quilt patterns.


