

September Speaker Deborah McHugh

This month's guest speaker, Deborah McHugh, had a fascinating story to tell. She had completed a fine arts degree at RMIT in her earlier years and has been weaving since her twenties. As she was presenting to a group of quilters, she brought along a quilt she made many years ago. It was made of small squares with the fabric coming from



her grandmother's stash, something to wrap herself in when she needs a warm hug. She also showed us some Liberty fabric hexies that she is working on together with her mother and sister.

She has returned to school recently to undertake a creative arts degree in visual arts. It was here, at sculpting school in the first year, that she realised what was meant to be. With all types of metalwork done by her ancestors, enamel work, jewellery, bronze work, it was in her DNA. Jumping into her ancestry and unravelling history revealed her 5 times great grandmother Jane, who was a convict and incarcerated at the Female Factory in Hobart. This has influenced her work greatly and with further research she found Jane's husband William, also a convict. Uncovering more and more, Deborah shared some of the punishments that William had received as a young prisoner in Hobart. This, at various times, included 20 lashes, solitary confinement and bread and water rations for 14 days, to name a few. Some of her latest works reflect the hardships endured by William.

Deborah has had exhibitions in various galleries including Wangaratta Art Gallery and Geelong Art Space. Some of her works were on display for us to see and she finished up by showing us another quilt she is working on, made with woollen off cuts. It was a pleasure to listen to Deborah's story and to see her work and how it has evolved over the years.

Our Quilt of Hexagons



QUILT EXHIBITION INFORMATION

Please include a 4×6 inch coloured photo of your quilt with your entry form. On the back of your photo print your name and the name of the quilt. Use an arrow to indicate the top of the quilt.

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING

- 1. Each quilt needs to have a 4" (10cm) sleeve.
- Each quilt must be submitted in a SEPARATE cloth bag with your name and the name of the quilt clearly printed on the front.
- 3. Tha absolute maximum size of any quilt is 96 inches width and 100 inches height. (250cm x 254cm)

Quilts are to be delivered to the Geelong West Town Hall via carpark entry on Friday October 24th between 10 -11am.

Quilts are to be collected from the same entrance on Sunday 26th October between 6 – 7pm.

Photographs will be taken of the quilts and may be used for publicity and promotion of Geelong Patchwork and Quilters Guild.

Public liability for the hall does not cover quilts.

It is your responsibility to collect or make arrangements for someone to collect your quilts.

Members' Stall at the Geelong Patchwork & Quilters Guild Exhibition

The Exhibition Committee invites members to make and sell items at the Exhibition. The items will need to be priced beforehand by the creator and the appropriate form to be filled in. The items need to be patchwork/craft related. Members who wish to sell items will be required to help on the stall during the Exhibition. The Guild will retain 10% of the sale price of the items sold. Same applies if you wish to place a "for Sale" sign on a quilt on display at the Exhibition.

Items for sale are to be dropped off at the side door of Geelong West Town Hall on Friday, 24th October between 10am and 11am. Pick up of any unsold items will be from the same location on Sunday 26th October between 6pm and 7pm
